Even though there is no stimulus help, we have a new Supreme Court justice. Just shows you that the Senate can do things when they want. Please take advantage of the NARFE legislative website to write to your elected representatives and let them know what you think. We must protect our constitutional rights, and also protect our Constitution.

- On September 30, the Senate approved a Continuing Resolution to provide funding allowing the government to continue operating thru December 11.
- The Trump Administration has officially abandoned the effort to merge the Office of Personnel Management with the General Services Administration.
- We thought nothing could overshadow the election, right? But not for Civil Service employees, as President Trump signed an executive order on October 21 that could effectively make higher-level “policy-making” positions political appointees that would not be covered by adverse action protections or unions. Agency heads have been instructed to reclassify positions performing such functions into the new Schedule F by January 19, the day before the presidential inauguration.

- **HR 8687:** Legislation proposed to block the above executive order; asks that the EO be nullified taking effect if enacted on October 21, 2020, the day the Order was issued.
- **HR 8598:** Social Security Expansion Act, which raises the 2021 COLA to 3% and bases future COLAs on the consumer price index for the elderly (CPI-E). It was noted that the 1.3% for 2021 is the second lowest increase in the history of COLAs for retirees.
- **HR 7864:** Merit Systems Protection Board Empowerment Act (“MSPBEA”) of 2020, requires re-authorizing the MSPB’s governing Board through 2025. The Board is currently vacant as the Senate has refused to vote on the nominees due to political issues. This has resulted in a backlog of almost 3,000 MSPB cases.

Research data on certain blood tests that measure abnormalities of the tau protein in the blood were reported at the Alzheimer's Association International Conference (AAIC) held on July 30, 2020, in Chicago. The research suggests these blood tests may detect the early onset of Alzheimer's disease, and that additional testing, such as the positron emission tomography (PET) scans and other currently used methods of testing may not be needed to confirm if a person has Alzheimer's disease. According to the AAIC, further research will verify if no additional testing is needed for a health professional to diagnose a patient with Alzheimer's.
