Nominations of Chapter Officers for the Year 2024

During the November 9, 2023, chapter meeting nominations were accepted for the four Chapter officer positions for the Year 2024. These positions are:

Vice President. President. Secretary, and Treasurer. After nominations were received at the 9th November meeting an instruction sheet and a ballot listing the nominated candidate's name and a column for a write-in candidate were initally sent to all members on November 23, 2023, who have an email address and for those members who do not have an email address an instruction sheet and ballot was mailed by USPS on November 25, 2023. Further, a follow up Time-Sensitive notice to vote was sent on December 3, 2023. The deadline for voting for the four nominated officers was Midnight December 9, 2023.

There will be no voting conducted at the December 14, 2023, meeting.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT AS OF 12/1/23 (Pending Legislation)

1. Social Security Fairness Act of 2023 (HR 82, S 597)

Repeals the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) and Government Pension Offset (GPO).

Current Status: Per the December 2023 NARFE Magazine – House cosponsors 298, and Senate cosponsors 46.

January 2023 was referred to the House Ways and Means Committee.

March 2023 was referred to the Senate Finance Committee (we have asked at both the National NARFE Headquarters and our NARFE to contact our representatives asking for the co-sponsorship).

There are now 298 House cosponsors, and 46 Senate co-sponsors. Representative Garret Graves (R-LA) is working on filing a motion that could propel the Bill for a floor vote or Ways and Means Committee action. Representative Graves and Senator Brown (D-OH) are the original cosponsors of the Bill.

On November 20th, a 'Hearing' was conducted at a Fire Department (Baton Rouge, LA) to promote the the WEP/GPO (HR repeal of 82/S597). Representative Graves was present along with leaders of the Fire and Police Departments, and several State and Federal retirees presented their details on how they are negatively affected by the WEP/GPO. All parties, including Representative Smith (chairman of the Ways and Means Committee), are strong advocates for the elimination of the WEP/GPO via HR82/S597. NARFE must enhance its' part for the same goal.

2. There are three other 'acts' in Congress that will eliminate WEP/GPO, but they have relatively lower co-sponsors for further movement.

HR 4583/S 2280 is one of them. This one expands and strengthens social security and improves the solvency of the Social Security Trust Fund while eliminating WEP/GPO. House co-sponsors 178, and 5enate co-sponsors 5.

July 2023: Referred to the House Ways and Means Committee, and July 2023 referred to the Senate Finance Committee.

3. HR 716. The Fair Cola (Cost of Living Adjustment) for Seniors Act:

The Act would use the Consumer Price Index for the elderly as the basis for the COLA retirement benefit. House co-sponsors 35.

4. HR 866. The Equal COLA Act:

The Act provides equal COLA amounts for the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS), as it does for the Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS). House co-sponsors 37. As of November 6, Senator Padilla (D-CA) introduced a similar Bill.

Picture this! It's the 1930's. The Depression era. My uncle was walking down F Street in Washington, DC and he was approached by a shabbily dressed man who asked for a nickel to buy a cup of coffee. My uncle quickly said, " I'm working this side of the street you go across the street." Of course, he wasn't working that side of the street, but he had no money to share. They were the days when money was scarce and very few jobs were available. My uncle did have a job. He worked at the Willard Hotel for a very small pittance, and it was hardly enough to support wife six hunary children. He was paid in cash every Friday. preclude loss or theft of that hard-earned money, he always took a cab home on Friday nights. As luck would have it, there was a wreck and my uncle was thrown from the taxi, unconscious. When he awoke, his money was gone, and it was just a few days before Christmas. No food, no presents were under the tree for those little hungry children. He said he felt like crying. He hated to go home. Meanwhile, his nephew who worked for the Alexandria Virginia Police Department heard about his uncle's loss. He couldn't help out. He, too, was struggling to make ends meet. It was so sad. He told some of the other police and they immediately decided to help out. My uncle said, as tears rolled down his cheeks. that was the best Christmas we ever had. Food was on the table and presents under the tree. My uncle was a good man and with a little help he and his family were able to survive. What a true blessing of kindness.
